Back-to-school Safety Advice

Now that school has started, you'll share the road with those familiar yellow school buses. It's time to remember the ABCs of school-bus safety.

Drivers:

- Stop. Both sides of traffic must stop when the school bus is loading or unloading students unless the bus stop sits on a separate or divided roadway.
- Slow down. Pay attention to pedestrian crosswalks and crossing guards. Watch for school safety zones – the times for those yellow lights to flash vary around Northeastern Nevada.
- Be Alert, pedestrian traffic will be at a peak. Watch for children walking, biking and running across the street.

Parents:

- Set your alarm clocks a bit early and make sure your students are at the bus stop five minutes before pickup.
- Remind kids to wait until the bus stops before they approach it. Once inside, kiddos should stay seated for the entire bus ride.
- Make sure kids know to head directly home after the bus drops them off from school.
- Remind your children of the basic safety rules for pedestrian travel.

International Cyanide Management Code

The International Cyanide Management Code (ICMC) was developed in response to concerns regarding cyanide management and use throughout the world. The code was developed under the auspices of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and the former International Council on Metals & the Environment (ICME). The code is a voluntary industry program and is comprised of Principles, which state commitments to manage cyanide in a responsible manner, and Standards of Practice, which identify performance goals and objectives that must be met. Newmont Mining Corporation is a signatory of the ICMC and, as required, is audited every three years by an independent third party.

The use of cyanide in mining is based on the property of cyanide to dissolve host metals that encase the gold particles. Cyanide is widely used for mineral processing and has no cost effective replacement. Prevention, monitoring and contingency plans are key to protecting human health as well as the environment.
