"When you do the training you think that you will never have to use it, and then when you actually do use it, and you realize it works and you can save someone's life with it" said Matt. Matt's heroic act also inspired others to get CPR training. After hearing of the accident, the victim's Pastor later told Matt that he was going to start hosting CPR classes at their church to educate people.
