## Newmont Employee Saves Life Of Community Member

It was just a typical day off for Leeville Engineer technician, Matt Chadwell, as he headed home from a morning outing with his family. But what started out as a normal day turned into a life changing event rather quickly. Matt noticed a man on the side of the road lying down and two other men around him. Being the good Samaritans that they are, Matt and his family stopped to see if the gentlemen needed help.

Matt quickly realized the situation was bad; the man lying on the ground was not breathing and did not have a pulse. After speaking with the other two men, Matt learned that the victim had been jogging and collapsed a few minutes earlier. Matt knew something had to be done, and quick! Matt began chest

compressions, the other bystander did breaths, Matt's wife Jen, coached the man doing breaths and stayed on the phone with 911 and Matt's daughter took the victim's dog to be comforted inside their vehicle.

The ambulance arrived shortly after. There was a clear indication the man had suffered a heart attack, so the paramedics shocked him with an AED and then transported him to the hospital. The gentleman was later life-flighted to Salt Lake City but has since regained consciousness and is doing well!

"The biggest thing I have taken away from this is the training part, I feel lucky to be able to get the training I get from Newmont because if I would have come up to that guy and not had the training that I had, you're

just helpless and you could have had the chance to save this person but you didn't have the training" explained Matt. Matt had no formal CPR training other than the training he has received from Newmont at Annual Refresher Training. Matt couldn't be more thankful for the training Newmont has provided him with.

"When you do the training you think that you will never have to use it, and then when you actually do use it, and you realize it works and you can save someone's life with it" said Matt. Matt's heroic act also inspired others to get CPR training. After hearing of the accident, the victim's Pastor later told Matt that he was going to start hosting CPR classes at their church to educate people.
